

Overview of the Lecture

Gender equity is fundamental to effective and inclusive governance. This lecture will explore how 'gender' is understood, influenced, and shaped by global governance frameworks, norms, and institutions. Drawing on feminist and postcolonial perspectives, it will examine how major international institutions have incorporated —or failed to incorporate— gender considerations into their policies and structures.

The discussion will also address efforts to transform existing governance frameworks and consider how emerging global challenges, such as climate change and digital governance, are both shaping and being shaped by gendered power relations. Offering valuable insights for professionals in international relations, development, and policy-making, this lecture aims to foster a deeper understanding of creating more inclusive and effective global governance structures.
