Leveraging Technology and Data for Justice and Security Sector Reform Short Course

Course background and objectives

In an era of rapid digital transformation, the justice and security sectors are increasingly integrating technology into core institutional processes. Furthermore, digital platforms, automation, and interconnected information systems are generating vast datasets, ranging from crime statistics, legal aid information, to correctional data, and digital evidence. These developments create new opportunities to improve public service delivery, increase efficiency, strengthen transparency, and expand people-centered access to justice. At the same time, this underscores the importance of ensuring robust personal data protection, safeguarding human rights, and integrating ethical considerations into every stage of digital implementation.

Indonesia has made progress in adopting digital innovation within the justice sector, even though it is still in its early stages. In the field of commercial law, the emerging use of digital contracts, online legal consultations, and online dispute resolution continuously transforms the area. Additionally, the new Criminal Procedure Code (KUHAP) and Criminal Code, which will take effect in January 2026, mandate the use of information technology to improve coordination and data exchange between law enforcement and judicial institutions, enabling real-time case tracking and reducing administrative delays. Substantial revisions to the KUHAP strengthen the recognition and regulation of digital evidence, aligning with the Electronic Information and Transactions Law (UU ITE), and establish oversight and protection mechanisms for the digital era, including broader control tools. Technology is also utilised to improve legal aid services, protect victims, and monitor the performance of institutional services. However, the adoption of digital transformation in the justice sector remains lagging, impacting case management processes within legal institutions and resulting in weak accountability and transparency, as well as reduced access to justice for the public. A lack of in-depth understanding of policies and regulations related to the use of technology and data can hamper its implementation and limit its broader benefits for the government and society.

In line with the mandate of the 2025-2029 National Medium-Term Development Plan (RPJMN) in the fields of law and security, the use of technology and data governance can contribute to upholding the rule of law and ensuring equal access to justice for all. This is also in line with the long-term goal of the Australia-Indonesia Partnership for Justice to have strong legal institutions and support the realisation of effective justice reform. This requires policymakers with strong analytical skills and a deep understanding of the responsible and rights-based use of technology and how to implement data-driven policy making in the justice sector.

This course will equip Indonesian public and private sector professionals working in the justice and security

sector with essential skills to navigate the complexities of a digitised legal landscape. It will address at least the following critical areas:

- 1) technological innovation, including the use of AI and emerging technologies, and its policy considerations in enhancing access to justice;
- 2) data-driven policymaking in justice sector;

This course also focuses on strategic, governance, and reform aspects of leveraging technology and data for policy development in the justice and security sector. By integrating these topics, the course will provide a holistic overview of how data and technology are used to improve the justice and security sector.

This course is designed for mid-level managers and professionals from Indonesian government ministries, courts, law enforcement agencies, universities, and the private sector (e.g. law firms and consultancies, professional associations).

Learning Objectives

The course will focus on the following learning objectives - the course will equip the participants to:

- Identify ways to enhance data-driven and evidence-based policymaking in the justice and security sector
- Analyse the policy and governance implications of emerging technologies such as AI, cloud computing and other technologies in justice and security sector service delivery in Australia and explore latest technological innovations to enhance access to justice in Australia, Indonesia and the region
- Explore ways to enhance data sharing between agencies/institutions (data governance, interoperability of data across institutions, standardisation of data)
- Develop plans for effective use of data in the justice sector to tackle challenges related to inefficiency, privacy, security, lack of transparency, and barriers to public access
- Benchmark judicial institutions' data governance and share interoperability of data across institutions, other layer they have to consider privacy, safety, standardisation of data
- Benchmark the Australian Government's Data and Digital Government Strategy and its 2025 Implementation Plan that guides the roadmap for data and digital transformation to deliver simple, secure, and connected public services
- Benchmark the latest developments from a regulatory and policy perspective and share lessons learned in digital forensics
- Develop practical tools and strategies to translate commitments on technological innovations to enhance access to justice into action
- Integrate GEDSI into data and technology-driven justice and security sector reform
- Foster innovation and build capacity to improve Indonesia's justice and security sector reform through case studies, peer learning, and cross-sector collaboration
- Share Australian lessons and expertise in the use of technology and data in the justice and security sector with their respective working units
- Build strategic networks with Australian institutions and experts for partnerships and future collaboration
- Create action plans (Award Project) to apply course learnings in their work and disseminate ideas

The course provider is expected to produce materials and training that can be communicated by participants at later stages to wider audiences in Indonesia. To achieve the above-mentioned learning

outcomes, the proposed course offers a structured learning process by applying a range of learning methodologies:

- Classroom sessions
- Case studies
- Site visits, including to Australian Government (state and federal) agencies, the private sector and other relevant agencies to learn about their latest approaches to the use of data and technology in the social and justice sector
- Discussion and planning sessions
- Simulations and role plays
- Networking events
- Award Project model is used across all Australia Awards in Indonesia short courses. Participants develop a project, conduct required analyses, present the project plan at pre-course workshop, further develop the project during the in-Australia course, and present the implemented project at the post-course workshop

Dates and location

Course participant profile

The course will be delivered to 25 participants. The participants are selected through a merit-based assessment process by an independent selection panel.

The targeted participants are mid-level manager or up to Echelon 3 level from the government responsible for developing and implementing policies and regulations from:

General criteria for the applicants

- Minimum 3 years of relevant experience
- Minimum S1 qualification
- Application is endorsed by the applicant's supervisor
- Commitment to prepare and implement an Award Project, an individual or small group development project as part of the course
- Commitment to engage actively and foster networks with multiple stakeholders
- Commitment to disseminate learning from the course with colleagues and peers.
- Applicants are expected to have **professional working proficiency in English**. The applicants' English language competency is part of the selection process. The assessment of language competency is based on a virtual (online) interview and any additional evidence provided by the applicant (proof of studies or living in an English-speaking country, working in an English-speaking environment, completion of studies in English, language courses or language tests)
- Applicants who currently hold a scholarship funded by the Australian Government are not eligible to apply for the short course
- Participants will be selected through a competitive process whereby applicants submit:
 1. Responses to selection criteria (3-4 questions)
 2. CV outlining their roles and responsibilities in the sector

Women from disadvantaged backgrounds and people with disability are encouraged to apply.

To be eligible, all participants must:

- not have Australian permanent residence status or be applying for a permanent residency;
- be a citizen of and residing in Indonesia;
- not be current serving military personnel;
- not be married or engaged to, or be a de facto of a person who holds, or is eligible to hold, Australian or New Zealand citizenship or permanent residency;
- have been working in Indonesia and in an area relevant to the short course preceding the date of the proposed commencement of the short course;
- be able to satisfy all requirements of the Department of Home Affairs for a visa;
- be able to participate in the nominated short course activities at the time and for the duration proposed by Australia Awards;
- be able to travel without family members as DFAT will only provide visa support and funding for individual participants, not their family members.

Gender equity will be a consideration and encouraged but not a constraint, given that participants are selected by position and position responsibilities. Australia Awards in Indonesia will convene an independent selection panel to review applications and select participants based on merit against the above participant profile.

Applicants shall submit their application forms directly through online application by **12 February 2026 at 23:59 WIB**.

The selection panel will convene to select up to 25 participants. All applicants will be informed of the outcome of the selection process by **the end of March 2026**.

Practical Arrangements

Logistics – Australia Awards in Indonesia will cover the cost of:

- Return travel to and from the pre-course workshop
- Return flights from the nearest airport to the course location
- Return travel to and from the post-course workshop
- Per diems to cover living expenses while attending the course (in Australia AUD82.20 per day)

Steps of Application

Participants will be selected through a competitive process whereby applicants submit their responses to selection criteria (4 questions) and their background information outlining their roles and responsibilities in the sector through an online application. Gender equity will be a consideration and encouraged but not a constraint, given that participants are selected by position and position responsibilities. Australia Awards will convene an independent selection panel to review applications and select participants based on merit against the above participant profile.

The selection panel will convene to select up to 25 participants. All applicants will be informed of the outcome of the selection process by **the end of March 2026**.
