- 12 weeks online Short Course from 29 September – 15 December 2021
- A hybrid mode (face-to-face and online) post-course workshop in Bogor, Indonesia (21 - 24 March 2022).

For further info about this program, Please contact Adam Wood, Development Coordinator, International Development, University of Queensland Email: adam.wood@uq.edu.au The purpose of the course was to allow Government of Indonesia (GOI) officials at all levels involved in the development and oversight of infrastructure projects to explore the range of considerations and options for GOI in meeting Indonesia's infrastructure needs. The course also aimed to improve inter-agency collaboration in determining what projects are funded and what financing/contracting models could be applied.

The course was delivered to 24 senior-level staff, including 12 women and 12 men, from a diverse range of institutions including the Ministry of Finance; the Coordinating Ministry for Maritime and Investment Affairs; the National Public Procurement Agency (LKPP); the Ministry of Agrarian and Spatial Planning; Akuo Energy; the Indonesia Infrastructure Guarantee Fund (IIGF); PT Indonesia Infrastructure Finance; the Ministry of Public Works and Housing; Ernst & Young Indonesia; PT Sarana Multi Infrastruktur (Persero); the Procurement Bureau of NTT Province; the Ministry of National Development Planning (Bappenas); and Bandung district government.

The course was delivered by the International Development unit of The University of Queensland. It was designed and led by Course Designer & Course Leader Associate Professor (A/Prof) Neil Paulsen from UQ's Business School, Course Co-Designer & Indonesian Infrastructure Specialist Dr David Ray, former Facility Director of DFAT's Indonesia Infrastructure Initiative, and Course Facilitator, The Honourable Rachel Nolan former Queensland Government Minister for Finance, Transport, Natural Resources and the Arts. They brought extensive experience in the fields of infrastructure financing and development in both Indonesia and Australia, as well as industry links with numerous experts who have worked in the infrastructure space in Australia, Indonesia and/or internationally.



The hybrid Post Course workshop (conducted online and face-to-face) was attended in person by 20 participants and virtually by the Course facilitators and 4 participants.

Session Highlights

- The line-up and calibre of guest presenters. The delivery team
 was able to draw in leading best practice expertise from the
 infrastructure sector from across Australia and internationally
 as presenters in the program.
- Providing additional mentoring support to the Award project groups through connecting them with real-world expertise about their project proposals. Many benefits of this support could be seen in how the groups developed their projects after these sessions, including more realistic mapping and pricing arrangements in the Project proposals.
- While the Award Projects were quite diverse, they all highlighted issues that need to be addressed when trying to engage the private sector to invest in Indonesia. The presentation from Sarah Schick provided detailed information about what investors look for and how they conduct risk assessments on potential investments
- Delivery over a longer period of time provided the delivery team with the flexibility to bring in guest presenters who could deliver sessions related to topics that emerged throughout the course. Examples of this included the team changing one of the sessions to a presentation about waste to energy, as that was the focus of one of the Award Project groups, and including a presentation in the post-course program on the wider economic impacts of infrastructure.
- The enthusiasm and engagement of participants throughout the course despite challenges for many participants of needing to balance their study commitments in the STA with their work and family commitments

Award Projects

As part of the STA, course participants developed and implemented Award Projects which applied learnings from the course to support the GOI to meet Indonesia's infrastructure needs. Participants developed and implemented Award Projects that covered a wide range of topics related to infrastructure financing including developing an appropriate model for a Public-Private Partnership for a waste-to-energy project, developing a policy recommendation on the implementation of a Limited Concessions Scheme for Central Governments, and making recommendations on an effective financial support scheme for Trans Sumatra Toll Road (TSTR) Project.


Some of the most successful projects included:

 lis Ratna Komala worked alone on her project to find a way to disincentivise car travel and raise money for public transport in Bandung. In the end, lis delivered a well thought regulatory scheme that could actually work to achieve this critical goal.



Award Project group members were discussing the follow-up activities for their project.

• Group 2 developed a model for the provision of water in the new capital city – a big project which is hard to envisage in a remote site that most have never visited. During the course it became clear this project needed to be considered in two ways – as a physical project involving water supply (dams, desalination or aquifers), distribution and retailing and as a financial model. The group's final presentation drew directly from course content and industry consultations to cover both aspects in-depth and even included maps of what the water scheme would look like and a price path for its delivery.
