

Australia Awards Indonesia - Short Course

Sustainable Tourism Management

Course Highlights:

- Online Pre-Course Workshop on 3rd, 4th and 7th of August 2020
- Online Monthly sessions from September 2020 to April 2021
- 12 week online short course from 12th of August to10th November 2021
- Post-Course workshop from 15th - 16th February 2022

The course aimed to improve sustainability in the tourism sector, develop linkages between tourism professionals in Indonesia and Australia, enhance business planning and tourism management and contribute to economic growth in the selected provinces. The learning objective of the course was to equip the participants with core understanding of sustainable tourism, challenges of sustainable tourism, role of community, key drivers that enable and limit tourism, relationship of economic growth and developing integrated tourism business and marketing strategies.

The Short Course saw 24 Indonesian participants from government departments and private enterprise complete a 12 week short course. The course enabled participants to share their experiences with Australian experts, network with fellow participants and learn from guest speakers and mentors through presentations, tours and interviews.

Leading the course was Associate Professor Sarah Gardiner, the Deputy Director of Griffith Institute for Tourism, (GIFT) Griffith University, Professor Noel Scott and Professor Bill Carter from University of the Sunshine Coast (USC).

Session Highlights and Site Visits

Due to the constraints related to the COVID-19 pandemic site visits were experienced virtually. Participants were taken on tours of various business and facilities involved in the tourism sector, A range of visits in Cairns were recorded using 360° cameras, enabling the participants to explore the locations freely. Participant Projects

Course participants were required to prepare a Award Projects research project, based on the learning outcomes. These projects were continuously reviewed and discussed with their group mentor throughout the course. These projects included:

Better Together - Sustainable Tourism Crowdfunding and Marketplace

The BTI group developed a crowd funding website that provides an opportunity for tourism organisations in Indonesia to raise capital to perform sustainable tourism initiatives. BTI partnered and launched with the Digital Mangrove platform to help the communities monetise their mangrove plantation.

Strategic Analysis of the Community Based Tourism (CBT) Market from Australian Perspective One group worked to collect authentic local stories that are of interest to tourists. These stories have been curated and intended to be developed into a resource book from the material.

• Competency Based Training

This group's project worked to upgraded the skills of hotels employees in Wakatobi. The training involved 4 days of training for 20 Room Attendant Hotel Employee.
